

Sunday School or Young Church

As you leave TFL's Embankment underground station you are tempted to walk into the attractive Victoria Embankment Gardens. Enclosed by trees and shrubs with lawns and colourful spring and summer floral displays the path has a succession of fine statues including one of **Robert Raikes** (1775-1811). The



inscription below credits Anglican Raikes with the foundation of Sunday Schools, but this not strictly accurate although he leading role in their play a development. Credit should be given to Hannah Ball who, after hearing John Wesley preach, opened a school in 1769 to educate poor children in Wycombe. Both Hannah and Robert believed that all children, both boys and girls, should be taught to read and that the best book for this task was the Bible. Raikes, as a prison reformer, believed that improved literacy would enable voungsters to find employment which

would keep them out of prison. As teenage children worked long hours in the developing factories of the Industrial Revolution, he opened a boy's school in 1780 in the poorer areas of Gloucester on Sundays, the Sabbath being the only day when boys did not have to work. Initially classes were held in homes of the teachers, but later rooms were rented for the purpose. This was possible because Raikes had inherited ownership of the local newspaper the Gloucester Journal from his father, thus he had the financial resources and the time to develop his ideas. In the early days he spent his own money on setting up Sunday Schools and published articles describing them in the Gloucester Journal which led to the idea being taken up in the parishes around Gloucestershire. Wider national publicity followed and this educational innovation spread nationally. Later girl's schools were created.

At first the schools were not linked to churches and religious education was not the main aim. Raikes later set out how his schools were to be organised. "The children were to come after ten in the morning and stay till twelve; they were then to go home and return at one; and after reading a lesson they were to be conducted to Church. After Church, they were to be employed in repeating the catechism till after five and then dismissed, with an injunction to go home without making a noise."

I suspect that many of my older readers attended Sunday School in their youth beginning on their own before the morning service and leaving after the first hymn, perhaps after a prayer or possibly a short talk from the preacher. Others may have attended a formal session in the afternoon with hymns, prayers and a Bible story told to them in a small group. I have been told that the Winchester Sunday School was attended by well over a hundred children each Sunday. Nowadays activities from dance, football or cycling and athletics have taken over and only a few churches have Sunday Schools. The description of the gathering as a school may have put off some youngsters and so the title **Young Church** has been substituted for it, though here at Winchester Road the young people aged 11+ chose to be called **Biscuit Club** and those 3-13 **Cookie Club**. We are pleased to note from the report to the annual Church Meeting that numbers have increased over recent months. The Sunday morning congregation, old and young join to sing a different active opening hymn each month led by children on the screens.

One of the characteristics of the Methodist church is hymn singing. John and Charles Wesley wrote and collected hymns on different themes publishing them in collections for the different seasons of the Christian Year or for particular groups of people. I suspect that many of you will be familiar with the blue bound 'School Hymn Book of the Methodist Church' which was published just after the war of 1939/45. Maybe like me you can still sing the words of some of the popular hymns from memory.

The best-known author of children's hymns is **Mrs Cecil Frances Alexander** (Born Cecil Frances Humphries in 1818) she was known to her family as Fanny.. She began writing and publishing hymns in her twenties including All *things* bright and beautiful, Once in Royal David's city, There is a green hill far away.

She has been criticised for her acceptance of the social class system by writing a verse in the hymn 'All things' which had to be deleted from twentieth century published versions of the hymn.

'The rich man in his castle, The poor man at his gate, God made them high or lowly, And ordered their estate.'

Her collection entitled 'Hymns For Little Children' went through 69 editions during her lifetime. She gifted the royalties of this book to a school for the deaf which she had helped to set up. In 1850 she married an Anglican clergyman, William Alexander, who became Bishop of Derry and after her death the Archbishop of Armagh. William (who was six years younger than his wife) and Fanny had three children. Throughout her life she was active in visiting the sick, supporting help for unmarried mothers and working to establish a district nursing service.

Sabine Baring –Gould born in 1834 was the grandson of William Baring, one of the brothers who founded Barings Bank, and also the heir to Lewtrenchard Manor House in Devon. After obtaining a degree from Cambridge (Clare College) he was briefly a teacher in two Independent schools before becoming an Anglican Priest serving churches in Yorkshire and Essex. On his father's death he inherited the Lewtrenchard Manor and when the parish became vacant in 1881 he appointed himself as Vicar. During his lifetime he published numerous short stories, novels, historical articles about Devon and Cornwall. Among his many publications were an anthology of *Devonshire Folk Songs* and collections of *Folk Hymns for the use of schools*. During his time as a priest in Yorkshire he wrote the hymn for which he is best known *Onward Christian Soldiers* to be sung 'on a procession with cross and banners. It did not become popular until Sir Arthur Sullivan wrote the familiar tune which I recall singing during my Sunday School sessions and Day School Assemblies.

Onward Christian Soldiers ,Marching as to war, With the Cross of Jesus ,Going on before.

Few of the hymns we sang in Sunday school have been included in the new Singing the Faith Hymnbook Allen Steel, July August 2025.

Our Young Church on Sunday

There are activities for the under 3's in the church, by the Hub. Those over 3 go out for sessions in Room 2 and the Hub. Currently, the older group, Biscuit Club, only meet by arrangement, but weekly provision provides for those aged 3-13 in Cookie Club.

The service starts at 10.30 and there is a children's action song before the young people go to their groups. It is a video which children and those 'young at heart' can learn and join in with during the month. So come early!



As our Young Church has grown in recent months, we are looking for people to support the groups, or even to lead occasionally. All those regularly working in Young Church need to have a current DBS and have attended a Methodist Safeguarding course. Please speak to one of the leaders if you feel you could help.

Most of you know that Mary Burgoine has collected 5p coins for many years to support the Methodist initiative to support healthcare in Nigeria. She recently received an update on their work.

"The Bethsida Orphan Care Project admitted 15 new babies in 2024. They were all successfully sent home in the care of extended families where they will be followed up by project staff until the age of 5. This community-based care has much better outcomes than traditional orphanages. The Agboke health centre rejoices in a new borehole and water system, donated anonymously by one of NHCP's supporters. This centre provides good community-based healthcare.

The word from Royal Cross Hospital Ugwueke is that although Dr Hans Corpit is no longer a mission partner (following the difficult decision by the British Methodist Church to make all lay mission partners redundant) there is renewed enthusiasm from local donors to build and equip a school of nursing and midwifery. We are seeing examples of wonderful things happening in Nigeria without our direct support but building on foundations laid by NHCP.

It's not all about money, though thank you for your continued and vital support, it's also about fellowship and faith. So many times our hearts have been warmed and inspired by our Nigerian sisters and brothers."
