One more step with Sydney Carter

For the Methodist Church, September is the beginning of a new year, the month when Ministers take up a new appointment if they are moving on. This year it is also a key month for at least two members of our Young Church who will take the important step from Primary to Secondary School. My wife and I will be thinking of one of our great granddaughters who will be leaving a nursery to begin at Primary School.

Sydney Carter wrote the words and music of a song/hymn (STF 476) which has become popular with schools which begins:

'One more step along the world I go, one more step along the world I go, from the old things to the new, keep me travelling along with you.'

Carter wrote the song/hymn for pupils in the Southwark Cathedral School choosing his words with care so that it could be sung by pupils of differing religions, or no religion. Surprisingly I have been told that it is now frequently chosen as a wedding hymn.

Sydney Carter (1915-2004) was a Quaker, a member of the Religious Society of Friends. In 1971 he wrote both the hymn and the tune which he named Southcote (after a former Provost of the Cathedral). The words were influenced by several passages from the Bible, including Psalm 37 verse 23 'The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord; and he delighteth in his way'. Carter was born in Camden Town and won a scholarship which



took him to Christ's Hospital School and on to Balliol College (Oxford University) and into teaching. During the War, as a pacifist, he volunteered to serve with the Friends Ambulance Unit and was sent to Greece and the Middle East. After the war in the 1950's & 60's he carved out a successful career contributing words and music to a number of revues on the London Stage alongside Donald Swan and Michael Flanders.

There are two other hymns he wrote included in Singing the Faith which I am sure many of you will know. In the first he 'tells the gospel story in the first-person voice of Jesus of Nazareth portraying Jesus' life and mission as a dance.' In this hymn Sydney was influenced by a traditional old carol 'Tomorrow shall be my dancing day'

I danced in the morning when the world was begun (StF 247.) with the chorus.....'Dance then, wherever you may be, I am the Lord of the dance said he.'

The hymn attracted criticism for Carter's portrayal of Jesus as the leader of a dance and also for reference to the role of the Jews in the death of Jesus (verse 3) which was seen by many as being anti-Semitic. Despite this criticism the hymn became popular due to his use of a traditional Shaker hymn tune' entitled 'Simple Gifts' composed for the hymn 'Tis a gift to be simple tis a gift to be free'. The Shakers were a mid-eighteenth century English Christian sect who held a strong belief in the imminent coming of Jesus. They emigrated to America in 1774 led by their founder Ann Lee where they formed sizable celibate, communal and pacifist communities in the North-Eastern and Mid-Western States of the USA. Shaker worship is characterised by its 'ecstatic nature' including dancing singing and shaking or trembling. Followers of Classic FM will also know this tune, which Aaron Copland used for his ballet Appalachian Spring.

The second hymn written by Sydney Carter came from a commission to write a hymn for the 20th Anniversary of the founding of the charity Christian Aid in 1965 for which Carter was inspired by the Parable in chapter 25v 31- 36 of Matthew's gospel. The Good News Bible entitles the passage 'The Final Judgement' describing the time when all people will be gathered and then divided into two groups, one on the right and the other on the left, in the same manner as the shepherd divides his flock into sheep and goats. The people on the right will be addressed with the words "I was hungry and you fed me, thirsty and you gave me a drink, I was a stranger and you received me in your homes, naked and you clothed me; I was sick and you took care of me, in prison and you visited me" (v 35 & 36). The righteous will then answer him "When Lord did we ever see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you a drink? When did we ever see you a stranger and welcome you in our

homes, or naked and clothe you? When did we ever see you sick or in prison and visit you? The King will reply 'I tell you whenever you did this for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did it for me!' (v 37-40). Carter put each of these needs and actions into a verse in the hymn which begins. 'When I needed a neighbour were you there, were you there.'

(StF 256) Each of the verses concluding with the refrain.....'And the creed and the colour and the name won't matter. were you there?'

This year is therefore the 80th Anniversary of this hymn described by one hymnologist as 'love without limits'.

I return to my opening theme of school steps and two lines from Hymn 476 which remind us that our life is a pilgrimage and in verse 3 where Carter writes: 'As I travel through the bad and good, Keep me travelling the way I should.'

'To live on through his songs will indeed fulfil Sydney's dreams. For the last five years of his life, the mists of Alzheimer's Disease gradually closed in and he was lovingly cared for by his wife who interpreted him to others. The past gradually receded into the strange land of lost memory. He died on 13th March 2004.' (from the Obituary in The Guardian written by his friend Paul Ostereicher).

The day, led by Gemma Player, included storytelling, prayers and reflections in the church, as well as craft, cooking and games. The most exciting event was the visit of live animals in the afternoon. (See Back and front covers.) As well as a snake and chameleon, the children



saw: tree frogs, a bearded dragon, a hissing cockroach and gerbils. We are very grateful to the number of people able to help on the day which made it a memorable day for all the children, and we received many messages from parents.
