Our local foodbank is celebrating its 14th anniversary this year! It was started by a Social Worker in

Walthamstow, who had started collecting items of food for those in need. It still operates in Walthamstow, but a branch was opened in Chingford Congregational Church in 2013, to bring help closer to those in need. Supported by all local churches, volunteers collect and sort donations on Mondays and distribute to clients every Tuesday. Over the years demand has increased and now they can serve as many as 40 clients (100 + individuals.) They provide fresh food as well as tinned and packeted food and at Christmas will give out gifts and Christmas food. Help is needed on Tuesdays, 8.30 - 9.30 to set up.

REMEMBRANCE

For many of us November is the special time when we remember family and friends who have died. The Church celebrates November 1st as **All Saints Day.** when all martyrs, and people who are recognised as holy persons or saints, are remembered. The Second Day of November is **All Souls Day,** the day to remember all those we have known and loved but have died. In some countries All Souls is a holiday when families lay flowers on graves, light candles and say prayers at the graveside. The evening before is referred to as **All Hallows Eve or Halloween**. I find myself out of sympathy with ghosts, ghouls and the scary events that are now attached to Halloween.

This year there has been an emphasis on remembering the end of the Second World War, eighty years ago. May 8th the anniversary of VE Day (Victory in Europe Day) was marked by a national holiday and ceremonies broadcast from the National Memorial Arboretum near Lichfield in Staffordshire. On August 15th we remembered VJ Day (Victory over Japan in the Far East), though the official surrender document was not signed until September 2nd1945. The second Sunday in November is recognised in Britain as **Remembrance Sunday**, the day when the nation remembers those who were killed during the two World Wars of 1914-18 and 1939-45. This year it will be held on **November 9th** the Sunday nearest the anniversary of **Armistice Day November 11th** when hostilities ceased in 1918.

Roy Falconer, father of our Son-in-Law, when researching his family history, knew that one of the family was killed during the war of 1914-1918 and buried in France. He wrote to the Commonwealth War Graves Commission to ask for the details and the location of the grave of his ancestor George William Falconer, aged 19, whom he never knew. When war was declared George, and three of his cousins, signed up to join the army. His first posting was to Gallipoli, from where he returned injured to Britain. On recovering from his wounds, he joined the Sherwood Foresters Regiment and was sent to fight in the Battle of the Somme in France. George and a comrade were sheltering in a bomb crater in No Mans Land when they took a direct hit from a grenade and George was badly injured. He was dragged back by his

comrade and taken to the Field Hospital at Acheux-en-Amienois where he died on 17th September 1916.

During the last two years there have been numerous gatherings of war veterans and ceremonies broadcast on TV remembering the two

European wars. These led our son- in-law, Russell Falconer, to offer to drive us to Normandy in the summer to visit the sites of the D Day Landings of 1944, the Battlefields of Normandy which followed, some of the cemeteries of the two wars, and also to see George Falconer's grave. Some Normandy war cemeteries have orderly rows of graves stretching



as far as the eye can see while others are just a handful of graves in the corner of a field. The grass is immaculately mowed and edged, and the plants pruned and tended. Visiting these War Cemeteries is a sobering and emotional experience. The Commonwealth War Graves Commission records information about the individual soldiers, when they are able, storing it away on site for visitors to read. We found the grave of George William Falconer in the beautifully maintained war cemetery beside the Supermarket in the farming village of Acheux.

The Cemetery at **Bayeux**, (see front cover), has 4,646 burials, mostly from the D Day Invasion of Normandy in 1944. It is the largest British War Cemetery in Normandy. **Laurence Binyon**, one of the noted poets of the First World War, served in the Red Cross. Our visits to the cemeteries brought words from his poem **'For the Fallen'** to my mind.

"They went with songs to the battle, they were young, straight of limb, true of eye, steady and aglow.

They were staunch to the end against odds uncounted They fell with their faces to the foe.

They shall not grow old as we that are left grow old; Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, We will remember them."

Our Young Church


